Despite the initial self-doubt, Shyanne pushed through, attending retreats and monthly meetings, and discovered a sense of belonging and purpose. While serving with L3 at Path United, she experienced the joy of making a positive impact. Reflecting on the experience, Shyanne captured the essence of service, expressing how the warm, happy energy and the collective effort to bring joy and relief to others made the whole endeavor truly wonderful. Shyanne cherished the moments of connection and hopes to continue spreading warmth and love through her future endeavors.
